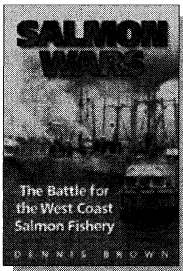

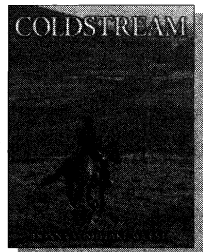
Coldstream
